If you need some inspiration, here is a summary of what CPAWS is saying:

CPAWS supports the proposed direction to strengthen the conservation and ecological preservation role of our provincial parks and to ensure our parks meet international standards for protected areas. We also strongly support the mandate of provincial parks as a way of connecting people to nature.

CPAWS believes it is of primary importance that:

• The Parks Act should mandate that protection of the ecosystems in provincial parks must be a high priority in park planning and management.

With respect to the *Stewardship* theme of the review, CPAWS believes the following elements are crucial to include in the legislation:

- The Parks Act should prohibit all industrial resource use in provincial parks (for example, logging, mining, oil and gas exploration and development).
- The Parks Act should require development and regular review of management plans for each park, with public involvement, that outlines the parks' conservation priorities and how they will be achieved.
