Views on the new Crown Forest Strategy

The provincial government recently announced it signed longterm, binding agreements with forest industry that guarantees a 25% increase in their timber allocation from Crown land. The new forestry strategy requires a 20% decrease in Conservation Forest and an increase in clear-cut size to meet this growth target for timber allocation. The expected economic benefit comes from \$600-million in new investments in existing facilities (pending favourable market conditions). That investment is estimated to increase direct and indirect forestry jobs by about 2%.
